

I would like to share a few vignettes of daily life as we work together to make the year a resounding success.

Thursday afternoons, we have Chapel followed by small groups at Houghton Academy. Our chapels begin with songs led by our Worship Team, an outstanding multinational group of Houghton Academy musicians who ably lead students, faculty, and staff. Typically, the music is followed by a chapel speaker. Our guest speakers come from "in-house" folks like girls' dorm parent Beth Brubaker or locals like Pastor Jon Cole from Houghton Wesleyan Church. After the service, we break up into small groups; boys with male group leaders and girls with female group leaders. I'm privileged to lead a wonderful group of young men from the USA, China, and Indonesia who particularly love the snacks I bring. The conversation may start with the chapel topic, but it soon turns to a free-ranging discussion about almost anything. When the bell sounds at 3:15, my room fills up with students looking for leftover snacks. I love these moments!

For the second year in a row, it has become a tradition for many middle-schoolers to bring their lunch to the Spanish classroom, which is located next to the cafeteria. They like to spend their lunch period eating, chatting, and joking in the cozy confines of room 100, away from the noise, tumult, and occasional bedlam of the cafeteria. The only downside to this custom is that the Spanish teacher must often run the vacuum after lunch to pick up their crumbs!

Panther Profiles

Kerrie Stockin ('90) Davidson: Club Leader, Receptionist... And Host Mom to half of Brazil

If you've ever stepped into the Davidson/Stockin house, you know it's never quiet. With nine people under one roof (including three of the six Brazilians who ended up in Houghton), Mrs. Kerrie Davidson has turned her home into a kind of international hub, carrying on the tradition set by her parents, Philip and Donna. At school, she is just as active as a volunteer: greeting



students at the front desk, helping with drama sets, washing lunch dishes, and leading clubs like Creative Arts and Skiing.

She grew up in Houghton, in the very house she lives in now, and attended both the Academy and University. After 25 years of moving around from California to Virginia (and many other places in between) during Mr. Davidson's military career, she returned to the small town that never really left her heart. "I always wanted to be a mom more than a career person," she says. Judging by the household she runs, that mission has been happily accomplished.

Family is central to Mrs. Davidson's story. She and Mr. Davidson met in choir class at HU in the '90s, and today their family keeps them both busy and proud. Their oldest son, Andrew, is married, attends law school in Chicago, and is father to Arthur, the grandson who instantly promoted Mrs. Davidson to her favorite title: Grandma. Evie, their daughter, is a nurse and will soon move to Delaware to begin a NICU residency. Wes is a sophomore at Indiana Wesleyan, majoring in business accounting with a Spanish minor. And then there's Joshua, a

senior at Houghton Academy. On campus, he's best known for his contributions to the athletic teams, and he hopes to join the Houghton University soccer team next fall.

At the Academy, Mrs. Davidson is involved in nearly everything. She leads clubs, brainstorms ways to support the drama program, serves as a board member, and keeps the front office running, all with her characteristic smile. In her free time, she helps manage the family art collection (www.Ortlip.art), and she and her husband enjoy slowly renovating their home, a hobby she admits they are still learning.

When asked about snow days, she smiles: a trip to see Arthur, crocheting, reading, or catching up with friends are her favorite options. Cooking, however, is not on the list. With a full house to feed, her free time is spent elsewhere. She also has clear ideas about school life: "I'd like more boarding students to be able to live with host families, to really share daily routines with them. It's life-changing for both the boarders and the family!" And on that note: if anyone wants to host me, Maria, in their house, I'm available. I can cook, I'm super nice, and I promise not to eat all your snacks.

The desire to connect and encourage others is central to who Mrs. Davidson is. "I hope people remember me as kind, friendly, and encouraging. I like to see the good in people and help students reach their potential." In her opinion, success is not about recognition or careers. "It doesn't matter if you're the best lawyer or the most famous doctor if you haven't met Jesus," she believes. "As a Christian, I try to ask myself every day how I can serve someone." Her life shows that faith, family, and service to the community go hand in hand, filling both her home and Houghton Academy with warmth, joy, and purpose.
